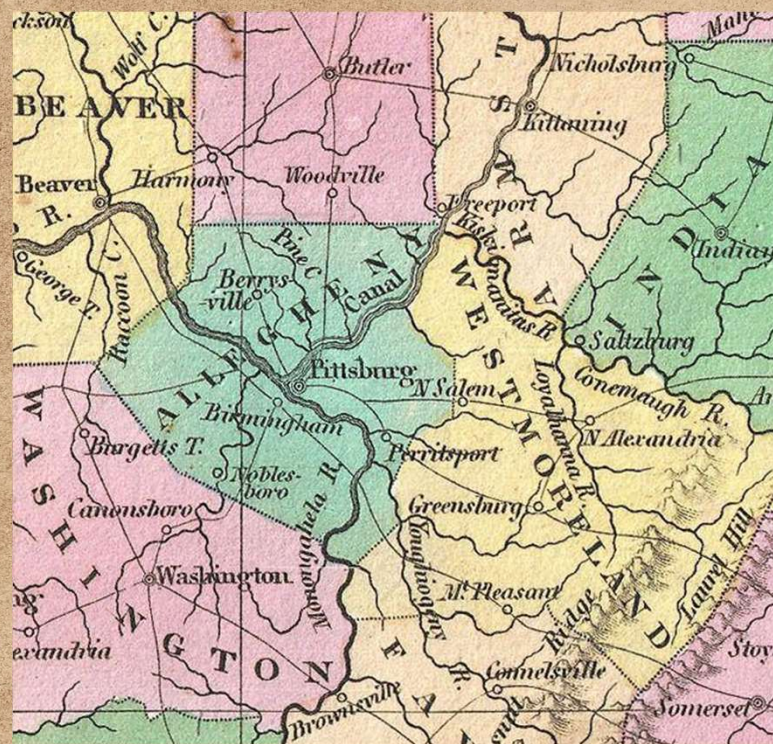
Samuel Allen was born to Rev. Joseph D and Sarah A

JOSEPH W. LONG, ESQ., died in Allegheny City, Pennsylvania, August 24th. He was an amiable gentleman, known to many Pennsylvanians now in Colorado. Mr. Long was an older brother of Hon. S. Allen Long, president of the Philadelphia and Pittsburg Coal company, of Colorado, and the Erie, Coal Creek and Denver Railroad company. Also a brother of Henry M. Long, speaker of the house of representatives of Pennsylvania.

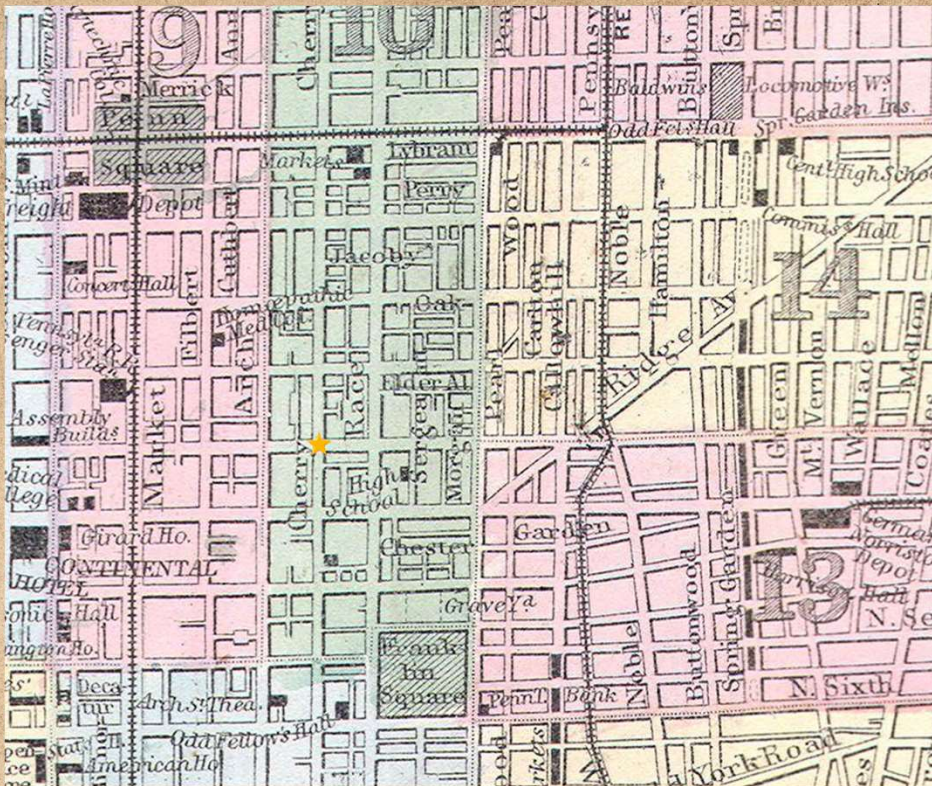

Samuel A. Long and Capt. Robert Carter, of Philadelphia, Pa., are stopping at the American.

Hon. S. Allen Long, ex-president of the Pittsburg city council and for many years a prominent business man of that city, now of Philadelphia, has been spending a week in Denver, and Boulder county, looking up coal interests and dispatching some prospectors. His rooms are at 15th and Curtis, and he will reside here permanently after June 15th. Mr. L. represents the enterprising Philadelphia bankers, Narr & Gerlack, No. 322 Chestnut street.

# RAILROAD



THE Erie, Coal Creek and Denver Railroad will soon be an accomplished fact. The charter of the company has been filed, and Hon. S. A. Long was chosen President.

Hon. S. Allen Long, president of the Erie, Coal Creek and Denver Railroad company, accompanied by a mining engineer, has been in the city for a few days past, looking at the mineral resources of Gilpin. Mr. Long is operating for English capitalists, and has already secured several Gilpin county properties, which he will place on the English markets.

# MINING



Hon. S. Allen Long, of Erie, this state, arrived in Central yesterday to obtain an extension of his bond taken in October last on the Wellington and Lynn lodes. He will also purchase the Hope and Empire lodes in the Black Hawk division according to the terms of a bond given at about the same time.

The Bullion Tunnel company filed articles, with a capital stock of \$1,100,000. Their purpose is to acquire and operate gold and silver mines in this state. The directors for the first year are S. Allen Long, Safford R. Hamer, Thomas J. Burke, Thomas B. Buchanan, Josia P. Ewing, Owen Pierrepont, Charles D. St. George and Thomas Egan. The principal office will be kept at Denver and the operations of the company will be confined mainly to Clear Creek county.

Files for his first Colorado homestead in 1884

In 1884, Long filed for a homestead in northern Douglas County, which he later expanded. By 1891 he had built a stone farmhouse on the property and called it Rotherwood after a farm he admired during his childhood.

S. Allen Long, President of the Philadelphia & Pittsburg coal company, has located in the northern part of the county and has named his ranch Rotherwood ranch.

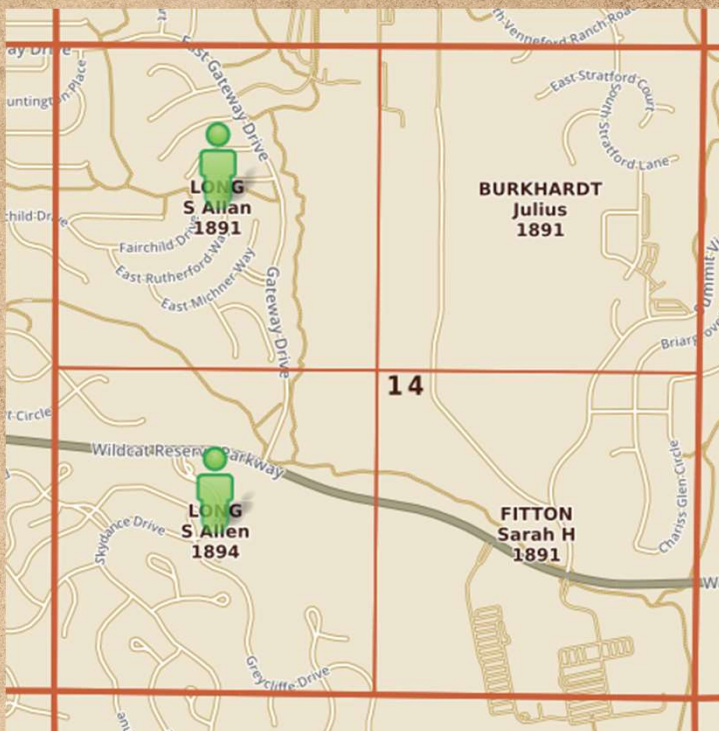

# AGRICULTURE

Long would develop a “dry land farming” technique to help with the agriculture in the dry climate of Colorado

Was a founding member of the Colorado Beet Sugar Association

S. Allen Long yesterday brought into the exchange some sample ears of corn grown at his place, “Rotherwood,” without irrigation. They are full, close and even and compare very favorably with the best showings of corn from Nebraska or Kansas, though perhaps not quite so large. Rotherwood is on the divide, about ten miles southeast of this city.

## Can we Grow Timber.

We have some testimonies on this question which we give here. Mr. S. A. Long, living in the north part of the county planted, last spring, 15,000 trees of various kinds among them were locusts, catolpas and maples, and he estimates that there is at present between sixty and seventy per cent of them living. They made a growth of from one to four feet, black locust doing the best and standing from three to four feet high. They were not irrigated, but thoroughly cultivated. Mr. Long is well pleased with his success and intends to put in as many more in the spring.

## Forest Tree Culture.

From the Colorado Springs Gazette we take the following, it being parts of a private letter from Gov. S. A. Long, giving his experience in regard to growing trees without irrigation near Castle Rock :

Thus far through four seasons, two of which we would call favorable, and two quite unfavorable from the standpoint of moisture, I have been very satisfactorily successful in growing forest trees without irrigation—the first systematic attempt of the kind that has been successful in this State, so far as has come to my knowledge, and I believe the very first. I have many black locust trees which have grown in that time, from seedlings eight inches high, to fine heavy trees twelve feet high, and thousands of them eight to eleven feet high. My elms, maples, walnuts, white ash and others have all grown proportionately well. I have locusts planted in seed two years ago that have grown from five and six feet high in the two seasons. My candid and settled opinion is that tens of thousands of localities exist in our State where groves of ten or twenty acres of forest trees could be successfully grown without irrigation. Who could estimate the beauty and utility such a result would accomplish in our noble State? For myself, I am determined to have hundreds of thousands of trees at Rotherwood.

Mr. S. A. Long has a large farm but has leased it to J. K. Walker, who is doing efficient work, having this year raised 120 acres of corn. Mr. Long is building a 30x45 feet stone house which is a fine structure for a farm home. He has 140 head of stock which he has recently had delivered, Mr. Blunt doing the job by the new method. By this means he expects to be able to have sufficient bedding for all his stock by making some additions, which he contemplates doing. There is also on this ranch the usual liberal supply of horses and mares together with an excellent imported stallion. What is perhaps of more interest than any thing else however, is the timber claim. Here is ocular proof that timber growing can be successful in Douglas county without irrigation. Mr. Long has made it a complete success on his timber claim. He has trees that were set out last spring and one two and three years ago and all of them are making an excellent growth. The land is neither better nor worse than thousands of acres all over the county. He has chosen a hilly place for his trees so that some of them are in a hollow, some on a side hill and some on the top of the hill but all are growing freely.

## Contributory Negligence.

In the case of S. Allen Long against the Tramway company for \$30,000 damages for personal injuries, which has been on trial for the past two days in the district court, Judge Burns directed judgment of non-suit on the ground of contributory negligence. An appeal was taken to the court of appeals.

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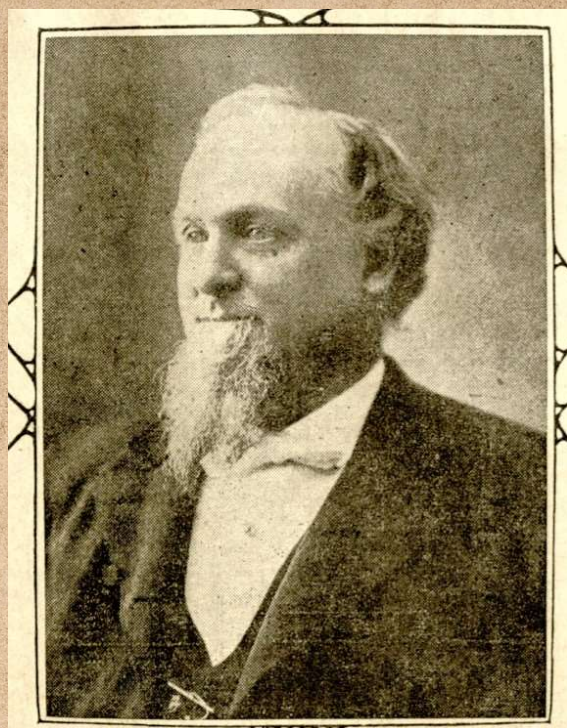


Ladies' Relief home in Denver

## ANOTHER PROMINENT PIONEER CITIZEN ANSWERS SUMMONS OF GRIM REAPER

After having been an invalid for thirteen years, five of which he had been confined to his room, Samuel Allen Long, one of Colorado's pioneer real estate men, passed away yesterday morning about 4 o'clock at St. Anthony's hospital. Mr. Long will be buried today, the funeral being under the auspices of the Sons of

the American Revolution. The services will be held by Rev. Charles H. Marshall at St. Barnabas church.

Mr. Long was born in Pittsburg, Pa., April 6, 1827. He lived in the vicinity of the steel city for many years, coming to Denver in 1880. After coming to Colorado he, for a time, engaged in coal mining in Boulder and the northern fields of this state. Later he moved to this city, where he became interested in real estate. His particular line of investment was farming lands, from which he accumulated a large fortune. He was associated with Charles Berger, for many years head of the Colorado National bank.

Mr. Long was a highly cultured and educated man. He had as classmates Judge Pershing, Thomas Gallaher and many other well-known professional men. He was an active member of the State Horticultural society.

Mr. Long was one of the prime movers in building St. Mark's church at the corner of Lincoln and Twelfth avenues. He was the first treasurer of the church and one of its chief supporters.

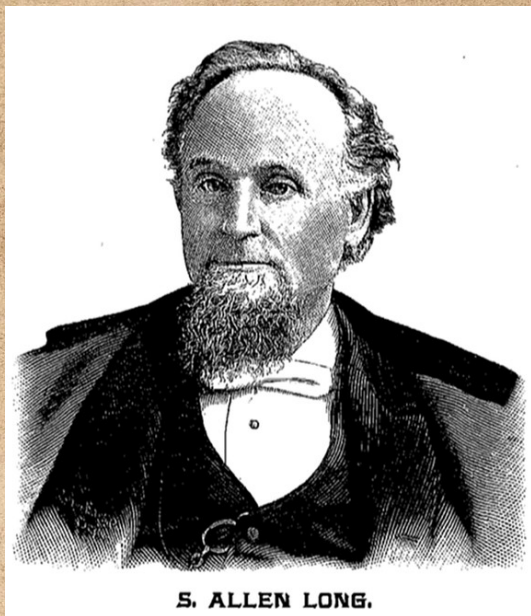

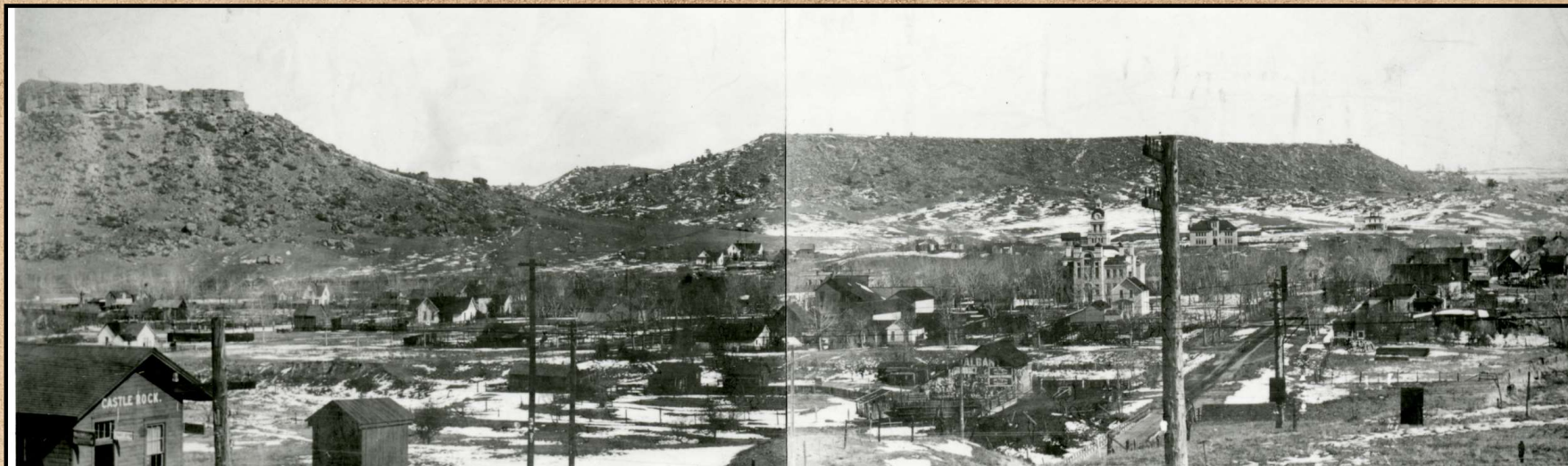
